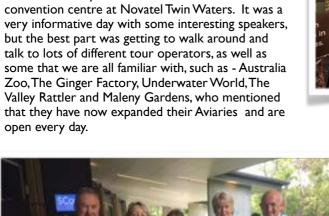

EVERGLADES ECO SAFARI

Familiarisation Tour: March 21, 2019

Nearly four years ago, a group of our volunteers were treated to a Familiarisation Tour with the Discovery Group from the Marina to the Noosa Everglades. Since then, Discovery has taken over the Elanda Point site on Lake Cootharaba, and have extensively developed the area for camping, together with Everglade Eco-tours departing from Elanda Point in a new, shallow-draught purpose-built boat carrying some 30 passengers. This boat has very large open windows allowing for much better views than the earlier boat.

Parkyn's Hut Vollies were invited to try the new service in small groups over several weeks in February and March this year, and Davina and I were the last of us to participate in this Famil.



We were picked up near the Big Pelican in Noosaville by the Discovery bus driven by Kristie. The shuttle bus picks up from various spots from Sunshine Beach, Noosa Heads etc. The trip to Elanda Point takes about 30 minutes. Most of the passengers on our trip were backpackers, with a total of about 30 people.

On arrival at Habitat Noosa at Elanda Point, we noticed quite a few changes since we last visited the site on a Famil in September 2017, at which time it had just been purchased by Discovery.

There are new fully self-contained Glamping ("Paperbark") tents from \$250/night, Wilderness tents from \$132, cabins, powered sites from \$44 per 2 people/night, and unpowered sites



The biggest addition was the CootharaBAR Bistro/Bar with an onsite brewery utilising local sand-filtered artesian water. There is a large dining area both under cover and alfresco: we will return to that later.



We boarded the boat at around 9:30. Access to the boat was via a 200-metre walk along a stony path, then from a floating jetty. The seating was quite comfortable, and, as mentioned above, the windows allowed very good views. There was also a small outside area at the front of the boat allowing good access for photos.

The boat captain Heinie was very knowledgeable, and he explained a lot about the quite different water ecosystems in the saltwater/brackish lakes and in the Everglades proper which is fresh water stained with tannin from the melaleucas which form most of the local tree vegetation. The river is fed by underground aquifers filled with rainwater percolating through the large sand-dune systems east and north of the river.

Over 44% of Australian bird species can be found in this region. Pelicans are of course quite numerous, as are cormorants and larger birds of prey such as osprey.







Sadly, as we passed from Lake Cootharaba into the Everglades, we noticed many dead fish floating in the water. It was thought that these were saltwater fish suddenly inundated with fresh water after heavy rain and were not a sign of anything amiss in the river system itself.



The Kinaba Information Centre at the northern end of Lake Cootharaba can be reached by boat, canoe or walking from Elanda Point. This centre was built in 1978 following a heated campaign in the 1960s to prevent sand mining in the area, leading to the declaration of the whole area as a National Park.



We made our way into the Everglades to make a stop at Fig Tree Point where the canoes were stored, and those that had elected to travel by canoe were divided into two groups.





One group was to travel upstream to Harry's Hut, and the other group was to make the return journey after morning tea.

While the canoeists were getting prepared, the rest of our party had a chance to walk around a 1 km track through native forest. We stopped there for about 50 minutes before re-boarding and wishing the canoeists good luck

We then headed to the CootharaBAR Bistro/Bar where, at a long table, we were served a delicious self-serve roast pork meal with roast vegatables, peas, plenty of crackling and all the usual accompanying trimmings. All the food is locally sourced.

Heinie also joined us at our end of the table to chat. Kristie also served the meals, and collected our empty dishes. She certainly earns her money! I was so enjoying the meal, I totally forgot to take any photos!

Having finished our lunch, we all reboarded the bus at about 3 pm, and were driven back to Noosa after what had been a magnificent day.

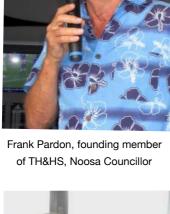

Did You Know?

Recycling started long ago in the Noosa Shire...

During the cyclone season 1947 to 1948, as well as Noosa main Beach and trees being washed away, all the buildings on the front dunes were undermined, one of which was the men's dressing shed

The council rescued most of the shed and stored it in the Pomona Council yard.

The chairman at the time, Stan Adams, noticed a large number of Council workers lived on the coast, but had to drive up to Pomona each morning to sign on and collect their gear, then travel

back down to the coast to work, then back to Pomona each afternoon to sign off. So he decided to transport all the sheds materials to Munna Point campground and re erect the shed for a sign on sign off point and storage shed for light tools and equipment, thus making it much more convenient for the coast council workers.

Next, when the power substation was moved from the now Good Shepherd School site, the Council then used that area for their yards and sub-office buildings so the old shed was moved up to this site.

Then when SEQEB moved out of their place opposite where Bunnings is now, Council moved in there - but the old shed was not wanted any more.

However all was not lost! The shed now takes pride of place at the entrance to the Council Tip and is now used as a shop for the recycled and repaired old pre-loved bits and pieces.

If that is not recycling what is over 80 years and still going strong and it is has had four different locations.

How many senses do humans have?

You actually don't just have five senses – many neurologists identify nine or more senses.

Yes, there are the basic five: touch, taste, smell, sight and hearing, but there are also multiple senses within each of the five, as well as some others. For example, touch is actually made up of several "somatic" senses, including the perception of heat, pain and pressure. Another is the organic sense, which is the sense of your internal condition such as hunger or thirst.
