


































Did you know?

Tewantin was affectionately called 'a small but loyal little place' in 1914 through its generous fund-raising for the war effort.

In August 1914, Noosa Shire Council started a Patriotic Distress Alleviation Fund. Many other organisations in Queensland did the same. All members of Noosa Council formed the committee to oversee and manage the funds raised. The Chairman of the council, Cr E. vonBlanckensee was the Treasurer of the committee and the Clerk, Edgar A. Edwards was it's Secretary.

Noosa Council's subscription list for the purpose of raising funds to help the war effort included the following;

Many fund-raising events were held in Tewantin and surrounding towns in Noosa Shire, some of them were Cooran, Pomona and Cooroy. Events were often imaginative and fun to attract people to come along and support the war effort.

Apart from social dances, there were film shows, local theatre group acts and fancy dress balls. Everyone was keen to participate for a good cause.

People gave willingly of their time and offered any amount of money they could spare.

One touching letter, written in June 1915 illustrates the feelings of empathy for those less fortunate, who were struggling during wartime shortages.

The letter was written by Olive Duke on behalf of herself, her sister Edith and her brother Neil. residents of Tewantin. The siblings unselfishly offered a donation towards the Babies Milk Fund.

Dear Mr. Editor - We would be very sorry to think that babies of Britain should want milk. My brother, and my sister and myself are sending a

> small donation of £2 towards the fund. Hoping the war will soon be over.

Another donation of £33 2s 0d was collected from Tewantin attendees at a social gathering held in the School of Arts. Some of the donors were named and included Mr. Atkinson, Mrs. J. Tait, Mr. C.W. Tait, Miss Tait, Mrs. Barker, Mr. C. Ross, Mr.W. Duke and the staff of the Royal Mail and others.

Many other varied events were held over the period of the war and Noosa Shire residents gave generously, which would have led to the Courier Patriotic Fund calling Tewantin 'a small but loyal little place'.

We who thoroughly agree with every man at the present time assisting the Empire in its great struggle for the prevention of what appears the slavery of the World to an ambitious attempt of the German Empire to control the whole universe. We recognise that by your remaining amongst us you could be of greater assistance to the Empire than by going to the front. It is necessary that the wheels of commerce must go on not only for ourselves but for mankind generally and although we are only a small community, we are doing our best to supply the public with the necessities of living and we think your leaving us will be a great detriment to our endeavours. In this district we have 21 motor boats, most of which are used in fishing and the general public who all depend on you for repairs and if you leave us those boats would have to go out of the district and if you leave us those boats would have to go out of the district to be repaired thereby laying the boats up for days and even weeks instead of a few hours.

We know your brother has already joined the forces and he goes with the best wishes of the undersigned and with the hope of his safe return who all recognise the loyalty of your family.






Free Buses

MARY VALLEY RATTLER

Familiarisation Tour: Nov 17, 2018

The history of the Mary Valley Railway is fascinating, and Parkyn's Hut Vollies were privileged to be invited for a familiarisation tour on one of this railway's restored steam trains travelling from Gympie to Amamoor and back, a round trip of about 3 hours with stopovers as we will describe. About twenty of us met at Tewantin to travel to Gympie in the RSL bus, driven by the very capable Peter. We were lucky enough to have fine weather, and we arrived at the old Gympie Station at around 9 am. This station is no longer used by QR: a new train line and station for regular trains was built in the period 1989 to 1995.

OLD GYMPIE STATION

The currently active stations (Gympie, Dagon and Amamoor) are all maintained and staffed by the enthusiastic Mary Valley Rattler volunteers. There is a newly refurbished Platform I Café at Gympie which we believe is run on a commercial basis, and a variety of food and beverages can be purchased there.

The carriages have several configurations: the one we were allocated (BLH 521) is entered from either end, with large padded seats. Other carriages had separate compartments, entered from a side corridor, and others again had separate compartments entered via outside doors on each compartment.

Our Class C17 locomotive was built in Maryborough in 1951 and was completely overhauled between 2001 and 2008. It weighs over 80 tonnes! For more information about the fleet, see https://www.maryvalleyrattler.com.au/our-fleet/.

Their chubby faces and big ears are signs of fortune as well.

Pigs have a beautiful personality and are blessed with good fortune in life.

Recent years of the Pig are: 1935, 1947, 1959, 1971, 1983, 1995, 2007, 2019

Paired with the Celestial Stems(天干—Tiān gān), there is a 60-year calendrical cycle. Although hài is associated with earth, the years also cycle through the five elements of nature (五行—wǔ xíng).

Personality and characteristics
Pigs might not stand out in a crowd. But they are very realistic.
Others may be all talk and no action. Pigs are the opposite.

Though not wasteful spenders, they will let themselves enjoy life. They love entertainment and will occasionally treat themselves. They are a bit materialistic, but this is motivation for them to work hard. Being able to hold solid objects in their hands gives them security.

They are energetic and are always enthusiastic, even for boring jobs. If given the chance, they will take positions of power and status.



They believe that only those people have the right to speak, and that's what they want.

Men born in the Pig year are optimistic and gentle. They are very focused. Once they decide on a goal, they'll put everything into it.
